Dear Harry:

In answer to your note about Albert Wieland, Jr., he was flying as ball turnt gunner for Willard Lockyear on the 14 Oct 43 raid to Schweinfut, in which we lost 10 aircraft. Bighteen planes took off tht day, three aborted aft-er crossing the enemy coast and all were attacked by the Luftwaffe.

The 10 places were lost before the target. The five remaining planes bomed with the 92nd Bomb Group, and then came home by way of a long, westward route over France. This probably saved them, as had they retraced their inbound path the Luftwaffe would have been waiting for them.

Lockyear's plane left the formation at 1400 hours with the #4 engine on fire. Four chutes were seen, and then the plane blew up. Another chute was seen in the smoke.

Survivors included the pilot, copilot, egineer, radio operator, two waist gunners and the tail gunner. The other three crew members were 198kly killed in the fighter pass.

I have never had any contact with any of the suvivors of this aircraft to get any better fix on just what happened to them.

My records on Wieland are scant: SSN 33333442, Air Medal, received an olc on 29 Sept 43. Assigned to the 309th squadron.

Sorry I can't be of more help.
